BOAT GREETER PROGRAM

SDRA's Boat Greeter Program is one of the "tools in our shed" - focused on preventing entry of aquatic invasive species, such as the dreaded milfoil, into our lake.

Scheduling:

- Cited below is the draft schedule up to this point; there may be other opportunities, including consideration of attempting to have a "Boat Greeter Morning" some favorable weather day, most likely a Saturday morning, during the summer when individual boaters come to the ramp to launch their boats.
- Please volunteer to become a part of this rewarding team effort. Many hands make light work!

How it works:

- A schedule for the boating groups that come to our lake for a fishing tournament is obtained.
- Judy heads a team of volunteers to greet the boats, arriving ½ hour prior to their start time.
- Permission is sought to inspect their boats, including the motors & trailers & possibly the well area searching for fragments or any tell-tale signs that milfoil is present.

What to expect:

- A favorable response from the visiting boaters it is rare to be turned down
- About an hour at the site, the public launch ramp on Sand Dam Rd
- On-site training to:
 - work with the boaters: always a friendly approach their cooperation is voluntary and we have no authority
 - training to identify milfoil; Judy is knowledgeable about other species as well and, if you are doing the inspection, can always be called over for an additional look at a potential problem
